

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Letter from the **CEO**

We defend a universal, free, and public education which respects and promotes diversity, combats inequality, and allows children to grow as people and rights holders.

How we transform

I sit down to write this with the challenge of choosing a few of the many actions Educo has carried out during 2022 and making sure that they serve as examples of the dimension and impact of all the work we have done.

That is why the first thing I want to do is to say thank you. I want to thank every single person who trusts our NGO on a daily basis, who believes in the power of education as a driver of the change we want to see in the world and who shares our mission and our values in favour of children's wellbeing.

I also want to thank the people who make up the Educo team and those that work alongside us every day to ensure that children enjoy their rights. Partner organisations, companies, associations, schools, local authorities, representatives, community leaders and an endless list of people who make us feel that together we can transform the reality of children who live in difficult contexts, even in emergencies through humanitarian aid, and with our development programs, our advocacy and mobilisation policies and our social research studies. These are the tools we have for getting to the root of the problems that affect children and contribute to achieving the desired changes.

And, of course, I want to thank all the children who participate in one way or another in our projects and who, even in the most complex contexts, are still keen to play and learn. And who help us believe that a fairer world is possible. We want children to live in a safe and protected space. We work with their community to ensure that they are free from violence, that they learn in protected spaces and that their whole community understands how important education is.

We transform by taking action on the ground

Looking back to the beginning of 2022, the first thing that inevitably comes to mind is the Russia-Ukraine crisis, a conflict that has been brewing for at least a decade. The news brought us images that, of course, we did not expect to see: children fleeing the war with their families, or even alone.

Faced with this situation, we set out to provide education and psychosocial support to children and adolescents through two projects: one in Ukraine with displaced populations, in collaboration with ChildFund Deutschland; and another one in Moldova, with the refugee population there, in collaboration with the NGO WeWorld. Both organisations are members of the ChildFund Alliance, which we also belong to.

Education in emergencies has also been the driving force behind our work with the Rohingya community in the refugee camp Cox's Bazar, in Bangladesh, and in Sahel, in West Africa, where armed conflicts continue to close schools and force the population to leave in search of peace and stability.



We also continue our cooperation programmes focusing on the three areas that we consider essential for child wellbeing: education, protection, and participation, 201 projects in total, with strong alliances with local organisations and the support of entities such as the European Union, the Spanish government, and businesses and foundations from the private sector who support our work. Over the next few pages, we will see some examples of these projects.

This year we also implemented a measurement system to understand and improve the social impact we have on the communities in the 14 countries around the world we operate in, a key step towards strengthening the trust of all our collaborators.





We work to ensure that children continue their education and live free from violence in situations of crisis, conflict, or natural disaster. Because humanitarian action saves lives and prevents suffering.

In Spain, we accompanied more than 100 children to the Galician Parliament, where they presented their needs, suggestions and demands to government leaders as part of the events corresponding to the Global Campaign for Education and the Global Action Week for Education, led by Educo.

Also, during the debate on the General State Budget 2023, we called on the government to ensure that no child in poverty is left without a school lunchroom grant and, at the start of the new school year, we demanded a free and universal school lunchroom by installing a giant tray in the centre of Madrid.

As part of our commitment to taking children's voices into account in Educo's governance processes, 22 primary school children were elected as members of Educo Bolivia's Children's Advisory Council and have already been participating in different decision-making spaces, giving their opinions, and proposing solutions to issues that affect them.

We transform by influencing decisions

The systemic and sustainable transformation we want to generate involves changing public policies, improving them, and promoting new ones, and also changing cultural patterns and social norms that are sometimes

much stronger than the laws themselves. In this regard, in Mali, for example, we actively participated in the elaboration of the national strategy to end child marriage led by the Ministry for the Promotion of Women, Children and the Family and, in addition, we produced a report on the conditions faced by girls forced to work as domestic slaves and presented it to the country's authorities. We also organised a digital awarenessraising campaign.



We transform based on knowledge and innovation

Social research allows us to understand the reality of the environments in which our programmes operate. That is why during 2022 we continued to generate knowledge about the ever-evolving changes and trends in the world and the realities of the contexts in which we work, work that is indispensable to fulfilling our mission.

Innovation can also play a key role in ending violence against children.

That is why we made two technological tools available to Spanish schools and organisations: the artificial intelligence platform Kanjo, which allows for the early detection of any type of violence against children in primary education, and B-Resol, an app for alerting about bullying situations.

During 2022 we made an important effort to analyse the school lunchroom in Spain and we published several documents about the lunchroom, which is not just about food but also about education, play and protection, such as the reports *El comedor escolar en España: la visión de las familias* and *El comedor escolar universal y gratuito: un objetivo alcanzable y urgente* and the study *Comedor escolar*, *normativas autonómicas*.

With the support of the Andalusian Agency for Cooperation, we are also carrying out a research project called innovative solutions such as new ways of preserving drinking water and new cultivation techniques.

Other research focused on the situation of out-of-school children and adolescents in El Salvador; the irregular migration of children in Guatemala; the relationship between the environment, rights and wellbeing of children and young people in urban areas in Bolivia; and the impact of local radio as a tool for social

We create spaces for children and adolescents to promote and defend their rights, to organise themselves to make proposals related to their wellbeing and issues that affect them.

Children's perceptions of the influence of the social and environmental setting on their wellbeing, which includes a consultation with nearly 200 children and adolescents, in order to explore the factors that most influence their wellbeing.

In India, we explored the Expectations and perceptions of well-being of adolescents in Mumbai and its slums; and in Bangladesh, we conducted two investigations into how people have adapted their lives and livelihoods to climate change exploring mobilisation of the population in Mali, among others.

As I pointed out at the beginning, it is difficult to summarise all the work we are doing in so few words, especially when trying to do so with a sense of pride at what we have achieved and with the commitment with which Educo approaches the reality of the nearly one million children who are the protagonists of our work. They are our raison d'être and our motivation to continue working.

Benin's proximity to Burkina Faso, where the security situation has deteriorated in recent years, partly explains the increase in terrorist attacks in the north of the country. In response to this growing insecurity, we encourage the participation of civil society in the prevention of radicalization and the promotion of a culture of dialogue and peaceful coexistence.

With regard to our work to guarantee the right to education and the quality of teaching in the schools we collaborate with, we train teachers in the use of new pedagogical methods, we supplied schools with school materials and accompanied the enrolment of nearly 9,000 children.

In the area of child protection, we contributed to strengthening the child protection system by reactivating monitoring committees in Borgou; finding foster families for girls and boys at risk of violence; providing technical and financial support to the Education, Social Affairs and Labour Ministries; and accompanying families to obtain birth certificates for their children.


We also continued our support for children working in unsanitary conditions in the Dantokpa market and in the port of Cotonou. Here, we offer them the possibility to study intensively at schools inside the markets, which enables them to obtain the primary school certificate in three years, as well as access to a safe space to wash and sleep, where they are cared for by youth workers.

The political context in Burkina Faso has been marked by a succession of coups d'état that have led the country into a period of transition until the next general elections, scheduled for 2024. The situation of insecurity, caused by individuals and armed groups, has led to the closure of basic social services such as schools, health centres, town halls and prefectures, and the massive displacement of the population.

More than 1.7 million internally displaced persons, 52 per cent of whom are children and adolescents aged 0-14, have taken refuge in 288 host municipalities, further complicating already difficult living conditions in terms of access to basic social services and provoking conflicts between populations for the control of scarce resources of arable land, water, and grazing areas. This situation made it more difficult to develop the present and future capacities of children, who were deprived of their right to education, health, and protection.

The security situation was exacerbated by social difficulties, which included civilian demonstrations, community tensions in some places, and violations of children's rights, particularly in relation to violence, labour exploitation and child marriage.

As for the pandemic, government control measures such as quarantines and school closures severely hampered people's access to their livelihoods and deprived children of their rights to education and protection.

Despite the fact that the security situation continued to deteriorate throughout the country during 2022 due to attacks by armed groups and the emergence of inter-community conflicts, Educo worked to cover the main needs of children in terms of access, quality, and participation in education; child protection; access to health services, food and drinking water sources in schools; and the provision of economic aid in cash.

In addition, with the aim of influencing public opinion and decision-makers regarding issues that affect children, we played an important role in the field of international NGOs in Mali. In particular, we have positioned ourselves as experts in the protection of girls forced to work as domestic servants, education in emergencies and sustainable development.

Another of our other notable actions was the high-level request to the courts to expedite and issue free civil registration documents and birth certificates for children internally displaced by violence. In addition to having had to flee their homes, these children are deprived of the fundamental right to an identity because of bureaucratic problems due to the different territorial jurisdictions, which make the process a real headache. Our petition mobilised several ministries and led to commitments from politicians and judges.


Niger's socio-political situation has remained stable since the inauguration of President Mohamed Basoum in 2021. But the country is facing a complex situation due to attacks by armed groups; floods, which affected 29,861 homes and caused 82 deaths; and the humanitarian crisis caused by forced internal displacement, with nearly 400,000 people displaced, especially to the Tillaberi region, and the arrival of refugees from neighbouring countries such as Burkina Faso.

The number of schools closed due to insecurity is 890, with a total number of 78,000 students affected. In this regard, we focused our efforts on emergency education and child protection, as more than half of the people displaced by violence are children, who are at risk of being abducted and recruited by armed groups.

We therefore launched a remote learning program using community radios so that children living in areas where schools were closed could continue their education, as well as moving children from conflict areas to areas where education is possible and setting up community open learning spaces.


We also carried out small infrastructure rehabilitation activities such as installing ramps in classrooms and latrines to facilitate access for students with disabilities, as well as other improvements to ensure the quality of education.

The year 2022 was marked by legislative elections in which, for the first time in Senegal's history, the ruling party failed to win an absolute majority, plunging the country into a state of tension that eventually deteriorated into the current wave of repression and violence.

Like other Sahelian countries, the country is facing food and nutrition security problems. On top of this, floods and other problems related to climate change, as well as the aftermath of the population's restrictions related to the COVID19 pandemic.

One of the biggest obstacles in the Senegalese system is still its limited capacity to provide quality education. According to the latest data, 37.4 per cent of children between the ages of 6 and 16 do not attend school. School environments, lack of infrastructure and poor quality of teaching are the factors that, combined with economic, political, and socio-cultural aspects, explain the low enrolment and completion rates in secondary education.

At Educo, we create participatory spaces in which the educational community works and reflects on gender and leadership and unites around associations to influence public policy. In addition, in order to improve the quality of teaching and learning and keep children in school, especially girls, we installed water points, latrines and built classrooms in three primary and secondary schools, as well as several other actions. **15 Secondary schools in Medina Yoro Foulah** offer innovative pedagogical practices with a **gender perspective.**



The experience of Educo's teams in Bolivia has allowed us to carry out important advocacy actions for the prevention of violence in schools. As a result, we were able to get the governments of several of the country's departments and municipalities to commit to developing strategies for the prevention of violence in the educational sphere.

In relation to our work on protecting the planet, we accompanied the municipality of La Paz in the elaboration of the Environmental Management and Energy Policy which included the participation of various actors linked to the issue, as well as the committee of children and adolescents from the municipality.

Also, in the fight against trafficking in persons, we developed, presented and obtained the approval of a communication strategy for the prevention of trafficking in persons and smuggling of migrants; the Departmental Plan against trafficking and smuggling of persons of the departments of Cochabamba; the Municipal Ordinance in Tarija with provisions for public awareness, training and education to combat human trafficking; and the Municipal Autonomous Law in Sucre for the prevention of this serious problem.

In order to raise public awareness of children's issues and to turn them into a social concern, in 2022 our efforts will focus on reaching a greater number of people on social media and in the press.

During 2022, vulnerable conditions persisted for children and adolescents in the country due to issues such as irregular migration and forced displacement as a result of violence, gender-based violence and the global economic crisis. Additionally, the social context was affected by the establishment of a state of emergency as a security measure implemented by the government.

Children have experienced several changes in the aftermath of the pandemic with a 48 per cent increase in mental illness and higher rates of anxiety and depressive disorders. Teenage pregnancy and gender-based violence have also affected the mental health of girls and adolescents.

In response to this situation, Educo works to promote the participation of children and adolescents in El Salvador through various initiatives, including our work in coordinating and launching the School for Democratic Coexistence, accompaniment of adolescents and young people in developing their life plans, a campaign on social media to highlight gender gaps, 16 days of activism for a life without gender-based violence and an empowerment initiative for boys and girls, *I lead here, I lead now*, and other actions. **46**



2022 allowed us to consolidate the projects launched the previous year and strengthen our work through collaboration with other organisations such as the Joining Forces alliance, the Red Niña Niño and other roundtables and networks dedicated to the rights and wellbeing of Guatemalan children. We also partnered with entities such as Starbucks Foundation, which supports our work to combat child malnutrition and prevent violence against children.

One of the innovative initiatives promoted in the country in relation to the improvement of education has been the introduction of the KAlite learning platform in partner schools. After evaluating this tool, we found that the participating students significantly improved their grades in mathematics.

During the year we continued our work to promote spaces for child participation. One of the most relevant activities was, through the Joining Forces alliance, two virtual meetings where a group of 90 children and adolescents gave their opinions to government representatives on the country's priorities for children and made proposals for improvement.

We also managed to continue our work in favour of children's wellbeing in Santa Bárbara, Huehuetenango, through the empowerment, social and political inclusion, and economic independence of indigenous Maya-Mam women.




After four years of suffering one of the biggest socio-political crises in the country's history, the impact of the COVID19 pandemic and the onslaught of hurricanes ETA and IOTA, which had an economic impact of 640 million euros, the country was on the road to recovery by 2022, a trend that continues today.

However, the level of wellbeing among the population leaves much to be desired, as employment rates and wages have fallen and the price of basic food items continues to rise, mainly due to external factors leading to higher prices for raw materials such as energy and fuel.

Therefore, although the country's overall economic figures are improving, the situation for individuals, especially the most vulnerable groups, is becoming more complicated, which is leading to the migration of the population to other countries.

In this context, we focus our action on our education and child protection programs. Some of the actions we can highlight are the launch of the campaign *Yo me Educo* (I educate myself), recognised as a success by the Ministry of Education, and the campaign *¡Usá tu superpoder!* (Use your superpower!), as well as the formulation and approval of a national advocacy project with the Ministry of the Family aimed at strengthening services and the adoption of the Positive Treatment Policy for civil servants, which will be mandatory.

During 2022, we reached remote areas of the country and provided quality education to children who otherwise would not have had access to it. We also recognised the importance of early childhood development care and education and invested in programs aimed at the crucial first five years of life. We also stood by the Rohingya refugee community by providing emergency education, protection, disaster risk reduction, climate change adaptation and prevention of gender-based violence.

In Bangladesh, children face social problems such as corporal punishment, sexual harassment, trafficking, child marriage, dowry, lack of education and child labour. Everyone deserves a safe environment to grow up and thrive in, which is why we work to change these social practices and set up child protection committees.

To mitigate the learning deficit, we initiated community training sessions run by volunteers. These sessions helped the children to continue learning and interacting in small groups in a happy and relaxed environment.

Building young people's self-confidence is essential for their personal and professional growth. To create a strong youth voice and accompany them in developing confidence in their abilities, we focused on providing them with life skills, vocational training, and sporting opportunities.

Despite the government's mass vaccination campaign and financial assistance for the most vulnerable families, the COVID19 pandemic has had serious and long-lasting socio-economic repercussions in Cambodia. Prolonged school closures have led to an increase in dropout rates and poorer performance, especially for children from low-income families.

While we resumed our actions on the ground, we conducted a study to identify the risks associated with the online learning that students were forced to adopt and we set up training sessions on online safety.

In terms of our work on access to quality pre-school and primary education, we focused on ensuring children's regular school attendance and improving their skills, especially in reading and mathematics, as well as improving teacher training in these subjects and the involvement of families in the day-to-day life and needs of schools.

We also called for schools to be safe spaces for children, free from violence, alongside homes and the whole community, where physical and psychological abuse are still seen as appropriate forms of punishment and instruction. Resistance to reporting crimes still persists, especially in cases of rape, because virginity is considered important for women when it comes to marriage. 813 students receive school bags, bicycles, school supplies and uniforms to enable them to go to school.


During 2022 we made significant progress in tackling child labour and promoting children's rights and wellbeing. We provided immediate support to the most vulnerable families, especially those of children involved in hazardous work, through training to enable them to find alternative livelihoods and the provision of seeds for growing vegetables at home, which has contributed to their self-sufficiency.

Children's committees and child-focused organisations have played an essential role in child and youth empowerment and participation. On the one hand, being organised has led to their participation in decision-making increased self-confidence and improved their public speaking skills and confidence in expressing their views.

On the other hand, being organised means having more power to bring about changes in public policies in local communities. Additionally, families have become aware of the importance of children's participation and now encourage their children to express their problems, needs and fears.


In terms of educational models, we introduced play-based learning methodologies, continued to promote positive discipline as a parenting model, and provided the necessary financial, material, and educational, medical, and psychological support to bring out-of-school children back to school. 391 children formed 31 children's associations.

After the devastating impact of the Delta variant of COVID19 in 2021, India managed to stabilise itself on the path to recovery in early 2022. By the first quarter of the year almost all schools had resumed in-person classes, and we were also able to resume our projects on inclusive and quality education, child protection through community empowerment and child participation in local government.

Thanks to the awareness-raising work and action with governmental departments, we were able to prevent child marriage and child labour situations for more than 400 children.

Through initiatives such as the Education on Wheels campaign or the Child-Friendly Parliamentary Forum, we innovate to meet the new needs of children in these post-pandemic times and advocate effectively for policy change. We successfully continued the Say No to Child Labour campaign and organised Working *together for Children*, one of the biggest children's film festivals in India during the year, which strengthened our visibility and our social mobilisation actions.

We built partnerships and alliances to take our advocacy and awareness-raising efforts for children's rights everywhere and developed social campaigns and joint initiatives with state governments for the promotion of children's wellbeing. **17,943 children** who are not in formal education **participate in our projects**.

With the latest twists and turns of the crisis caused by the COVID19 pandemic and its economic consequences on the population, during 2022 we gradually resumed the normal rhythm of our activities in the country and adapted them to the new post-pandemic situation.

In this context, we continued, for the tenth consecutive year and in collaboration with schools and organisations dedicated to children, to distribute scholarships during the school year and during the summer holidays, while also calling on various political bodies for a free and universal lunchroom for all children as a learning space that goes beyond just healthy eating. Because the lunchroom is also a place of protection, interaction, and education and as such should be a part of the right to education.

We also resumed many of the child participation activities that we were only able to carry out online during the pandemic, such as the activities around the Global Campaign for Education in Galicia, the Basque Country and Andalusia; and through our PROTEGEmos methodology, we accompanied leisure and free time organisations, sports and educational centres and residences in developing protection policies and complying with the requirements of the new law on child protection.



Our Priorities



The world we want is one in which all children enjoy an equitable, safe, and quality education; are protected from violence and exploitation; and are able to drive social change in their environment. These are our three priorities, and we organise our work around them to address the causes of vulnerability and exclusion.



Education

We defend a universal, free, public education, which respects and promotes diversity, combats inequality, and allows children to grow as people and rights holders through positive relationships with others and their surroundings.



Protection

We work to ensure that children and adolescents know their rights and we promote positive treatment as a social tool to prevent violence against children through the reinforcement of positive practices and the improvement of laws that ensure their protection.



Participation

We promote actions that enable children and adolescents to exercise their citizenship through participation and leadership; to make them visible and acknowledged and take part in decision-making processes and lead change in favour of their rights and their surroundings.



Education in Emergencies



We work so that children continue their education and live free from violence even in emergencies, conflict, or natural disasters. During 2022, we focused on actions in the Sahel countries, in the Cox's Bazar refugee camp in Bangladesh, and in Ukraine and Moldova.

Standing by Children in Ukraine

The greatest failure as humanity is to force children to see wars with their own eyes. How can we legitimately tell them that conflicts can be solved in a nonviolent way? How can we teach them that violence is not the path? Children have the right to have a childhood free from danger, to grow up with their families, to have their basic needs met, to play, to study. The news reports mark 24 February 2022 as the start of the new chapter in the nearly decade-long conflict between Russia and Ukraine and bring us images that, of course, we did not expect to see: children fleeing the war with their families, or even alone.

In response to this situation, and in collaboration with the ChildFund Alliance, we are providing emergency education and psychosocial support to children and adolescents during 2022 through two projects: one in Ukraine, in the districts of Reni and Izmail in Odessa oblast, through partner organisation Smart Osvita and in collaboration with ChildFund Deutschland; and another in Moldova, in the districts of Chisinau and Criuleni, in collaboration with the Italian NGO We World.





Specifically, in Ukraine, our response focused from the outset on providing in-person and online catch-up classes, non-formal education, extra-curricular activities, socio-emotional learning, and promotion of social cohesion for children affected by internal displacement. Outside Ukraine, we ensure continuity of education for children through the Stay with Ukraine programme for pupils in grades 5-11. We also work to improve the wellbeing of refugee children and adolescents in Moldova, with a special focus on vulnerable groups.

In a humanitarian emergency, education must be a priority for children's wellbeing because it not only ensures that children continue to learn, it also means that they have access to a space in which they are protected, and kept away from dangers such as trafficking, labour exploitation, forced marriages or recruitment as soldiers, and where they can play and share a routine with their peers. School also provides them with access to health, hygiene, and nutrition by ensuring food, clean water, washing facilities and medical care.

Our Principles

At Educo, we are committed to promoting participation, non-discrimination, transparency, and a dynamic spirit as pillars of our everyday

These four principles permeate our work and examples of them can be found throughout the Annual Report.

We would like to take this opportunity to highlight some other relevant actions such as the participation of Educo Bangladesh in the Gender Violence and **Displacement Management Cluster of** Humanitarian Action, which served to present our work in this Asian country on how climate change influences the displacement of the population and in favour of non-discrimination based on gender, given that emergencies affect men and women differently.

As an example of encouraging participation, during 2022 we put in place mechanisms for suggestions, complaints, and commendations so that anyone can give us feedback on our work. In the case of the children, families and communities involved in our projects, we consult with them to jointly define the most appropriate mechanisms in each context.

We also use the Post-Distribution Monitoring methodology in our humanitarian action projects to gather information on the satisfaction levels of the people who receive products or services in crisis and emergency situations. One of the ways in which we demonstrate our transparency is by means of the certificate awarded by Fundación Lealtad, which we are renewing for another year, and the open days in our offices, an opportunity to share information with children, families, organisations, stakeholders, community leaders, institutions and donors, and others.

Some examples of the dynamism that we strive to include in our work can be found in the online campaign Web Safe & Wise, which we joined as members of the ChildFund alliance to promote child protection in the digital environment.

One of the main activities of the campaign is to create a Global Children's Advisory Council to actively involve children.

In 2022, Educo assumed the role of international NGO representative of the Latin American Campaign for the Right to Education (CLADE), a network of civil society organizations from 18 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean that promotes social mobilization and advocacy for education.

Our mission is that children fully enjoy their rights and a dignified life, and to achieve this it is fundamental to show the situation children are in around the world and get to the roots of the problems they face. These are some of the publications that we launched during 2022 to raise awareness of this reality among the people, companies and institutions that collaborate with our NGO, as well as society in general.






